A minute ago, you were talking about an expedition that you went on with Daniel Allen Jones this last year Correct. I'm looking for giant salamanders. Tell us a little bit about that real quick.

Yeah. So when we say giant salamanders most people are familiar with salamanders and the known species in North America at the heart of the largest one is called the hell Bender which is in the Eastern US and it can get to be like a couple feet long, which is pretty darn big but embedded within Bigfoot literature. You will often hear these stories and accounts of monstrous salamanders in the same areas that the Bigfoot is said to inhabit in Northern California, the area around Klamath River, Bluff Creek, Trinity River, and so forth. And these accounts date back to the 1920s they're actually Native American traditions to go Wow. But as far as like modern sightings go back to the 1920s and 40s. And people would claim to, to come across these salamanders that were like five to nine feet long, which is at least as big or much bigger than any known species. Humans are

pretty that's a pretty big amphibian. Like reptiles get that big. Yeah, even here in the United States.

That's that's a good point. You know, and we could talk about there were actually amphibians that large in the past, you know, if you look at our historic records, yeah, you know, dating back to the Carboniferous, which was the age of amphibians, you have like 15 foot long, you know, a Lambo mirrors and yeah, those but anyways, we basically just wanted to do an expedition to search for these giant salamanders there have been periodic expeditions throughout the decades, some funded by Tom slick, who was kind of a pioneer in the Bigfoot field. Yeah. And so yeah, we went up there. A team of us from Texas and Oklahoma, as you mentioned me Daniel Allen Jones. Jason cons Coburn, who's a Texas Bigfoot researcher and exotic animal handler. And Jim Whitehead, who's a Bigfoot researcher and wildlife biologist from Oklahoma who specializes in amphibians. So we went out there. We met up with Jamie Wayne, who is a member of the Bluff Creek project, which is the group that has been managing the site where the Patterson Gimlin film was was shot and they, they basically been documenting and maintaining that for years. And yeah, so we went up there and, you know, we looked for giant salamanders. We had underwater cats. cameras and nets and we spent a lot of time waiting

the you know, they're fast running cold streams. You know, we're basically just poking our hands under rocks again just noodling new bass. Yes. And you know, I consulted with wildlife biologists who do giant amphibians surveys and Asian stuff. And that's a that's what they do they sweep this. So we didn't unfortunately, didn't find any monster salamanders. But, you know, it was a good experiment and a good way to kind of develop a methodology, a process, if you will. And also, you know, we, we saw some just unbelievable habitat, very remote, untouched ancient forests in Northern California. No logging, no development, pretty remote. And so there certainly is, at least a biological viability. Such a species could exist similar to the critter crypto grandkids of of Asia. And, you know, we always kind of had an eye open, you know, in our peripheral vision for maybe a Bigfoot or a Sasquatch that might be peeking. And we actually, we got to the cherry on top of the cake was we got to visit the film site. So Patterson Gimlin film site, I actually got to walk the trajectory, where the subject in the film walked in, just to get a perspective as far as what what was going to Yeah,

yeah. And that must be especially really interesting for a researcher like you to go and see the actual perspective, the scale perspective of things. Yes. Stuff like that.

Yeah. And it's, it's changed a bit, you know, you can imagine her when that film was shot, and on October 20 1967, this was a couple years after a major flood event in that area. So everything had been flattened. And it was pretty much yeah, you can see the downed trees and stuff in the footage, but it's kind of grown up, you know, and there are new trees there and stuff. The creek has moved. So it's like farther, you know, farther away from where the film was shot. And it's actually very lush. I mean, it's kind of like a rain forest kind of feel around the creek, you know. So yeah, so we didn't again, didn't see Bigfoot there, but and the Bluff Creek project has actually put up a number of trail cams all over that area for since 2012, hoping that they would get something but they Yeah, they did. Actually, the one thing that they did accomplish, which is pretty amazing, is they documented a type of Martin, which is a mustelid. Yeah, like, yeah, that it was supposedly the Humboldt Marten, which was supposedly extinct, and they call it Wow, film. Wow. And they're in

the same case with the ivory billed woodpecker. You recently Yep. That that was confirmed much in the same way where it was a random trail cam that was done for totally different research. Sure, know what to say, I talked to Daniel Alan Jones on the show about, you know, being able to actively get grants through universities, things like that, that are actively doing wildlife studies, to be able to go out and sure you're using it for this, but you can still provide them with the footage, you can still provide them with trail cam pictures, things like that, that helped them in their research, as well. And kind of piggyback on that kind of stuff.

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Absolutely And you know we're a lot of us, most of us are citizen scientists, as Daniel so

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eloquently put it. Absolutely. We try to follow scientific methods. And yeah, you know, use critical thinking and remain objective, but it's all about evidence, you know, trying to find definitive evidence. And yeah, but there's not a lot of funding for us. crip, Aino, cryptid hunters. Yeah. So you know, we're pretty much all self funded and stuff, which you know, is fine. I'm not complaining, it makes it harder, sometimes Sure, sure, to achieve these lofty goals that we said,

And heard scuttlebutt about that, you know, amongst uncles, things like that going up in the area, but what was it for you that first made you decide to go down this path as your path of calling is your path of vocation?

Well, of course, people ask me that a lot because it's kind of a an untraditional way to go about life but I You know, I never planned to make this a career. Yeah. It's been a lifelong passion since I was a little kid. And what I always tell people is, you know, my father was a scientist. So I was raised in kind of an academic household where we, you know, learned about deductive reasoning and things at a young age. And my mother was a travel agent, and she loved to travel and explore very pioneering kind of spirit. And to have my gloves when I was a kid were animals and creatures I had my first pet was a small alligator called a caiman. And I love exotic collected snakes and selling things. And I also love monster movies. You know, I was raised on Godzilla and Creature from the Black Lagoon and all those classics totally. So when I first heard about, I saw a TV show about Bigfoot when I was about nine years old, just came on one Saturday morning, and it was just like something inside me clicked. Because if you think about it, something like Bigfoot, it kind of combines or synthesizes monsters and animals or creatures. You know, it's kind of like both and that's what cryptozoology is really about. It's a, it's about animals and creatures, if you do it traditionally, sure. And follows zoology, but it can

also they're often like, look fabulous legends and stories and things. Yeah. So yeah, so that's just something I was, you know, since I was a kid, I've absorbed everything I could on the subject. And then when I was 15 years old, my mom arranged for my father and I to visit Loch Ness and Scotland. Oh, cool. My dad's an avid angler. So we were doing a lot of fishing while we were up there. But of course, I spent most of the time trying to find out about Nessie the Loch Ness Monster. So I had a an eight millimeter movie camera. I was interviewing locals, I was hiking around the lake and try. Yeah, I was 15 years old, I was playing field research. So so so yeah, it's just been a lifelong passion of mine. And I've just been very blessed, Chris, in terms of having opportunities to write books and do TV shows. And so you know, what is your father think of your research? Oh, he's very proud. That's awesome. To hear. He doesn't really, really just recently retired. He was after years of doing science and different things. He he became a math teacher at my old high school, and teaching advanced, you know, calculus or whatever. And he always liked the first day of school, he would, you know, bust out a couple of my videos from my TV shows. And you know, this is my son looking for Bigfoot and stuff. He's very, that's, that's great. You know, everyone, you always want your parents to be proud of you. And yeah, especially when you do something really weird. So

well, and especially, you know, it's great knowing that your father is proud, especially since he is a scientist. Yeah, you know, because it could very easily be the case of like, look, this, here's my crazy son who goes out and does this stuff. But that's not what he does. So the fact that he is legitimately interested in your research and sees it as credible is a beautiful thing.

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Thank you. That's a great point. I don't know. You know, we haven't had serious discussions. Now. His specialty is more like he's a forestry professor, statistician, he counts trees and things like that. But yeah, he, you know, he's definitely an open, he's open minded. And I think that's a true scientist, I think always has to remain somewhat open minded and object to any theory or hypothesis. What

is the points that I bring up with? Craig will heater the Southeast Texas Bigfoot folks, anybody whenever we're talking Bigfoot, or cryptids, is don't forget, last year, during a pandemic, we found 1000 new species, during a pandemic, like research and travel was shut down. It's true. And there was 1000 new species found. Take a look at any map of the US at night taken by NASA. And almost the entire region where most Bigfoot sightings happen is black. So that means like, it is not settled the way the rest of it is. There's no people out there like that. So yeah, there is a great swath of America that is still unsettled, and untouched, like you said, the forest out in California was so there's a great possibility of there being a good home range.

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Now. That's you stated the argument beautifully there, Chris. And you know what I try to tell neonle, and particularly in this day and age, it's it's pretty easy for humans to feel omninotent.

people, and particularly in this day and age, its test pretty easy for namens to reer offinipotent

with, you know, with our smartphones and stuff, because you can Google anything. And you know, we've got we've got this all figured out. Well, I have as he, as I said, I have traveled around the world to 26 different countries. I've camped along the Amazon River, I've hiked the Australian Outback, I've, you know, bended jungle habitats around the world. And, you know, you're right. I mean, there's based on one recent survey, I think, at least 47% of the Earth's land surface, we're not talking about the we're not even talking about the deep oceans of anything down there, you know, absolutely. But 47% of the land surface still is technically classified as a wilderness area. I'm gonna try Humans don't sit there and think about all of the jungles, swamps, forests, mountain ranges, tundras deserts. I mean, there's just a lot of places that humans don't live. And so there's always that potential there for discovery.

And much like, whenever we have whistleblowers, or anything on the show, I'm always bound to believe them or a victim. Until I hear the other side, I am always more bound to believe 1000 years or so of tradition from Native people, and their stories of what's over there. And what grandpa said was over there, and what dad said was over, they're pretty sure they've been around a little bit longer than us and have that oral tradition. You know, maybe we should heat it a little bit and check into it. Yeah, you know, instead of just dismissing it so outright, sometimes that's a

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good point. And, you know, I have, you know, also been blessed to, you know, have conversations with indigenous peoples in different areas that catch Kenai of Central America, you know, Inuit people in Alaska, and, you know, other tribes around the world. And, you know, we always have to honor and respect their traditions, I think, because they've, like you said, they've lived in certain areas for a long time. They know what animals live around them and stuff. But, you know, they don't, frequently, a lot of those native cultures and traditions are not readily shared with quote unquote, outsiders. Yeah, true. Now, they true their culture, you know, it's, it's their identity. It's what belongs to them. And so as much as we would like to think that we could as a Bigfoot researchers, you know, go onto a reservation. I'm just speaking hypothetically. Tell us about your Bigfoot. So, here's my cameras. They may or may not, you know, depending, and I and that's absolutely true. So they probably and I have found also in recent years, having me had the opportunity to speak to some Native Americans, for example, that there seemed to be a lot more sightings and activity of Bigfoot in and around reservations and traditional areas where they lived. Think about it, it makes a lot of sense, because we know that Native Americans have, you know, been here at least 12,000 years, maybe 30 50,000 years. And if Bigfoot or Sasquatch exists, it certainly feels more comfortable probably being around these people that it's been lived alongside of for 12,000 years, as opposed to these newcomers.

Quantity, yeah, it's a known quantity of as far as a wild animal goes no different than when you move in the neighborhood if the coyotes come by or not, for a little while, exactly. Much less, like you said, living in the same area, knowing the same places to go get game, knowing the

same places to go graze, for food, things like that. Those are things that yeah, the tribe would know, for hundreds of years on the back end like Zach, this time of year, you can go over there and catch salmon that are landlocked right now. You know, stuff like that. So absolute, internal knowledge that, like you said, would not typically be shared with outsiders or anything like that. So really interesting that there are more, that there seems to be an uptake of sightings around those areas. Yeah,

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that's what I've, you know, at least seems to be that way, you know, and it just says, you as you kind of immerse yourself in the subject matter of Bigfoot or whatever you did, or whatever in general, sometimes even someone like me that's been doing it for decades, you you know, you new new information surfaces, or you get a new perspective on something and you kind of, you know, that's that's really the fun part of doing it. Yeah. new information and new new trails to follow.

I even had an experience in Louisiana, my my aunt used to date one of the chiefs of the Krishna Indian tribe, okay, we were out on their property one time for just a family event, all up around this campfire at like 11 o'clock at night. And I saw literally, a mountain lion walked by on the dirt road. And I was like, Hey, man, like anybody else. Just see that lion. A couple of my family members are like think your extracurriculars are taking over Chris. And the next day, you're like, Yeah, I saw large cap prints out in the road knows like, Look, I told you, and there are no mountain lions out here. Like that's a dog print. I don't know. And that is what I ran across the jaguarundi. Okay, yeah, Houston and like sightings all across Houston for years, things like that. Actually, the come to find out the source of the name of Houston Cougars was actually sightings of that. Yeah. All kinds of things. So it was one of those like, wow, cryptids right in my backyard. Like I lived in spring branch Houston. And it was like, this is literally Buffalo Bayou like this is my backyard that they're talking about. And to know that now, Texas Parks and Wildlife has seen jaguarundi they have seen tracks of drag were undie and apparently the population is back on the Rise. So something that was once a known species that became possibly extinct and became kind of a cryptid where it was like, Hey, I saw this thing, right? Like no, you're crazy. INS up though they are back they are on the rise. So there are so many cases like that. It's it's really interesting.

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That's that's a great illustration. Of course, in terms of animals, cats are among the most elusive species because they're very stealthy. ambush predators. They're good at hiding and not being seen. Yes, solitary. Typically. I mean, I investigated a case in Mexico 2014. This is on the Science Channel, he made an episode of it where there were a lot of livestock killings. Mysterious number of goats and men killed in like, one night, it was crazy. It was like, Oh, wow, at goats had been attacked and killed by something. And of course, again, we talking about the traditional people of that area. It was the chupacabra. Oh, that was a nugget. While it was some legendary creature that did this. And based on the wounds that I examined on these, you know, I was shown photographs and stuff I thought, you know, this looks like a mountain lion

did this. And I did some research on that. And I found out that actually, it's very rare. But there have been episodes documented episodes where mountain lions have gone Psycho and gotten into a sheep or goat pen and killed dozens of animals and they're not hungry. It's just bloodless. Yeah, it's, it's like they just go it's like

a, but no different than any cat that's going to just play with a bird in the backyards and houses on and then leave it there. Lizard brought it to you as a present. Exactly.

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But anyways, my point with this is I you know, these people have lived there for generations. And these go farmers. I mentioned that too. I said, I think, you know, I think it was actually a mountain lion that got in your pen, and they told us, oh, there are no mountain lions here. We've never seen a mountain lion. There. They're here. They're here. Now lions are the most widespread mammal and one of the most widespread mammals in North America, from Alaska to Argentina. I mean, they are their range, but you don't see them. And they might see their tracks. Yeah.

And they've got a home range that is literally miles breath for each one. It's pretty amazing. So I want to thank you so much for taking the time today to come by talk. Now I'm down to like two figures a week, just because of like work. Yeah, I'm going back to school taking some classes for a new degree. Okay. So yeah, it's a long process now. Take a lot of it. I would say work is what's taking up a lot of time. This is really what I want to do.

But you know, somebody has because it is, like you said, a time consuming and very, very hard intensive process. eBay now, with your processes, it's something that because obviously, you must either have a vast collection of things to build on top of, or, which I don't know, a builder out there that didn't just have like drawers of, you know, I'm sure your drawers a buddy of mines, drawers of just electronic parts and things like that. So same thing, different story. But, man, is it one of those that whenever you see a figure or somebody mentions a figure, do you already have a figure that you're going to change in mind? Like sometimes? Yeah. Oh, like, yeah, that totally reminds me like the Iceman from the original 80s Or like the original 90s Run, you know? Yeah, like that.

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More women are for actual people. Okay. I have to find that find the right head to use as a base. Sure. And sometimes it's a long process of me just sitting there thinking, what am I use, but I use a aves epoxy sculpt to build on top of that head, or really whatever. Yeah, and it's not the best if you look up close, but it's, I think it looks good.

locally, come out and support like this. Sure. Now you you are, at least to me, one of the one of the first cryptozoologists that I ever found. It was something for me when I found you that it was a whole new world of knowledge for me. And at the time you had Cryptomundo was new, all that kind of stuff. And what what has it been like for you to see a scene like this grow? To see more researchers coming about? Well,

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to me, you know, I really enjoy the camaraderie, the networking, you know, these are great events for people, you know, wanting to meet other people that are interested in the subject. And, you know, I've always told people, you know, even when I was doing active field work, you know, that over 50% of this is the camaraderie I mean, there's nothing better than hanging out with people liked by a group of like minded people with a common interest. I mean, you know, any better than that?

And even the fact of like, I was saying his his father, who is a scientist, being proud of his research.

Oh, same with my father. My father was a physics professor. Oh, wow. And, you know, he was based on you know, hard, repeatable evidence. Yeah. But, you know, he, you know, I've been doing this a long time, you know, publicly you since 1999. started hosting a Texas Bigfoot conference in 2001. And, you know, I've started you know, adding more events. I just recently moved to Jefferson, which is the the Bigfoot Capital of Texas. Yes, it is. I wrote the town proclamation myself and 2017 Yep. And 2018 got, you know, the mayor finally signed it. You know, they've erected a, you know, Hive size big foot statue placed there by the Chamber of Commerce. And most of the restaurants have A big foot burger, a big foot barbecue sandwich or, and, you know, several of the retail establishments are, you know, carrying a lot of big foot souvenirs and T shirts and stuff. So it's, you know, it's really been embraced. I mean, I've received, you know, three town proclamations actually, in 2005. It was proclaimed that the third weekend in October in Jefferson was Texas Bigfoot weekend. Oh, wow. And I was presented with that proclamation as well as a key to the city. Wow. So then in 2016, they issued a proclamation in observance of the 15th anniversary. Like I said, in 2018, they, the proclamation of the Jefferson being the Bigfoot Capital of Texas. And, you know, just last October, we held our 20th anniversary event in Jefferson. So, you know, I'm expanding advance I've moved to Jefferson now. So I'm planning to host you know, one event a month I host, you know, car club events, car shows, but most of it is, you know, cryptozoology related. Yeah, I've got another event coming up in September. That's going to be a cross over from Bigfoot to paranormal investigation, a group of female team, paranormal investigators, but they've recently well, seven years ago or so branched out into Sasquatch investigation. Wow. From, you know, in the Fargo, North Dakota area, are coming down to do some Bigfoot stuff. And also

to have an overnight paranormal investigation at the historic haunted Jefferson hotel in Jefferson. And then I'm like, you mentioned I'm starting up a Texas UFO con. In November in Jefferson, I have the Texas Bigfoot conference in October. In December, I have the the Bigfoot Film Festival and Marshall. So you know, it's really been embraced. In you know, over nor Far East Texas. You know, majority of the Bigfoot reports in this state take place in the Eastern 1/3 of the state where there's an abundance of rainfall, precipitation, and abundance of cover and above an abundance of food source. And, you know, that's where, you know, all the wild animals congregate. Yeah, if they're, you know, the real animals, creatures, whatever you want to say, they need food, cover and water. And if you have those three things in abundance, you have an abundance of wildlife. Yeah. And, you know, if it's Bigfoot related, then there's an abundance of food source for, you know, whatever, the Bigfoot maybe heating, you know, plants, fish, turtles, deer, Wildstar, you know, livestock from local farms. So, you know, it's there's ample, ample territory, you know, in the four state region of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana, and they all come together, all four, and that's a concentration of forest land there is. I believe in the four state region. There is 100,000 square miles of forest land, which is bigger than the size of the entire state of Oregon. Yeah, of forest land in the four states. And like I said, when you've got that with abundant rainfall, water source, and, you know, other food sources surprise, yeah, you know, you're gonna have animals. I mean, we have black bear, we have, you know, wild hogs. We have all kinds of, you know, even big cats, you know, mountain lions are seen here in this four state region. So, I mean, if it can support those animals, it could easily support a Bigfoot.

Absolutely, absolutely. And I think, something that we were talking about with Ken Gerhart, a while ago, that a lot of people I think slips their mind whenever you're talking about trying to find a species like that, that kind of stuff, is that the home range of even the average species whenever you're talking about a cougar, a bear, it can be miles. Oh, yeah. So you know, trying to find where it beds down, or where it's eating that kind of stuff.

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Well, I liken it to, you know, not not even looking for a needle in a haystack. You're looking for a moving needle, and a whole field of hay. Yeah. You know, I mean, in the Pacific Northwest, the last count that I knew of, there were 72 aircraft that had crashed in the, the forest redwoods and forests of the Pacific Northwest that have not been found. Yeah, that's 72 airplanes and those things have transponders and those things are not moving. Yeah. And they're made of metal. Yeah. And they can't find

them. And we know, last known direction, last known altitude, last known speed. So figuring out a path of where you should be, you know, that'd be rocket math.

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You know neonle think that you know humans have covered every square and yeah territory

in, in the United States or North America. And it's it is just not the case.

For for Jefferson, and every time you've been on our show, we were even talking about it with Ken Gerhart, earlier, I always show the map of the United States that night is taken from the space station. And granted, you know, the the most recent, I think that NASA has posted is probably about five years ago. But even five years ago, whenever you look at the map of the US at night, I'm about halfway over from the edge of Texas over is dark at night. And that really does like you're saying illustrate how much wild territory there is out there. Especially in the Pacific Northwest. Yeah, there's even been the reporter that started doing the missing 411 series, right, which has been incredibly popular. And just the fact of there are so many people and strange instances within our national parks, that they can't even find people that go missing things like that. So yeah, yeah, really, really wild stuff. A bounding within those nature preserves, things like that. Now, in your letter A over 20 years of research in this field, Craig, what what has been some of the standout moments for you and things that you have investigated or cases that have come across your table?

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Well, you know, I've probably talked over 300 people, and that have claimed that they've seen, you know, one of these animals, creatures, beings, whatever you want to say. And, you know, there's only a couple possibilities as far as I'm concerned, you know, either they're lying about it. Somebody could have hoaxed them. They could have been on under the influence of narcotics or alcohol. Sure. They could be mistaking known wildlife or person. And the only other possibility assay is are they saw what they say they saw? Yeah. And if even one of those people is telling you that, then, you know, there's something out there. And I have my own experience from Louisiana 1994, where I saw something, no more than 20 feet from my vehicle at night on the side of the road, that I can't explain away. So, you know, if I threw out everything, everything I've ever talked to anybody, you know, I have my own experience that I can't explain away.

Yeah, and at that point, it's one of those like you. I don't know, you seem like a pretty sane individual Kragh through the conversations that we've had privately and on air. So just as with any whistleblower, or anything like that, until proven otherwise, I tend to believe your eyewitness account. Well,

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you know, the thing to me. And I don't typically use the word belief, because it's taking something on faith. If you know, I think that the evidence, points to these things being there. Yeah. I mean, to me, it'd be far harder to believe that every footprint footprint tract that's been

seen and cast and every eyewitness sighting is a hoax. Yeah. Or mistaken identity than it is to take the preponderance of evidence into consideration that points to you know, something is there.

Yeah, yeah. And even if you're talking that preponderance of preponderance of anecdotal evidence, sure, you know, even the preponderance of stories that are out there, because they, one of the things that we talk about regularly on the show is crop circles. And of course, people bring up a hoax crop circles, right? It's like, okay, yeah, there are hoaxes and a lot of modern hoaxes, a lot of modern, you know, artists out there doing things like that, Doug and Dave Yeah, yeah. And, but it's also one of those the stories of the devil circles in England go back to the 1500s. They go back to the time of the Black Plague. And, you know, what they didn't really have a whole lot of time to do in the black plague, like fake crops, make fake crepe circles or destroy half a field, the crop, you know, you would have been driven out of town. Right. And when you're talking about people in the 1800s, things like that, that have anecdotal sightings where they were in newspapers, that kind of stuff. Yeah, it's it's hard to dismiss that because they thad some thing better to do? Sure than to fake that or to try to sensationalize that you saw something.

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And here in North America, the Native American Legends and Lore go back hundreds and hundreds of years, that they accepted them as another tribe that lived in the woods. Yeah. You know, and some tribes, you know, even I wouldn't say traded with the bootleg food offerings for them yet, but some tribes avoided them at all costs and said that, you know, they were to see one was a death Omen, you know, so, there's been, you know, all kinds of, you know, legends and lore dating back hundreds of years, you know, certainly before, you know, the Patterson Gimlin film, and that in 1967, or the famous Bigfoot tracks that were the name Bigfoot was coined from 1958 in Northern California. And, I mean, you know, even here in the south, you know, Bigfoot was not used, I mean, people, you know, it was the boogeyman, or the wild man of the woods or whatever. It wasn't associated with Bigfoot. Yeah, and those, those go back hundreds of years.

Yeah. And especially now, even regionally, whenever you're talking about citing things like that, they tend to take on different names, you know, skunk ape, was visited Australia, and it's the YALI Yeah,

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I mean, here in the south, I mean, you know, you can come across most rural communities, and if they have a creek, they got a monster that goes with the creek, the Turkey Creek monster, you know, the all of these different, you know, the chambers, Creek monster, you know, these are just several that, you know, in, you know, in northeast Texas that have communities where

there's creature has been side by side. And, and, you know, when you get out to areas, like, you know, out here in Far East Texas, you know, when you talk about this stuff, you know, it's a good chance that somebody that you may be talking to, you know, didn't personally have an encounter, but have a friend or a family member that has seen something, and is told them about it. Yeah. And a lot of stories don't even get told, because people are afraid of being ridiculed.

Absolutely. Absolutely. And that's just it. That's the one thing that we bring up regularly on the shows that a good 70% of the place it is it is not within the person's vested interest, who come forward with a UFO story, with an abduction story with the story of a out of body experience, or D, or even a Bigfoot encounter? Because like you said, most people would be ridiculed. Yeah.

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I mean, I've had people from all walks of life, all occupations, you know, submit a report with their name and phone number attached. And, you know, if a, you know, from clergymen, to, to law enforcement to military, you know, I can see no motivation for them to submit a report saying they've seen one of these things, and attach their name and phone number to it. Yeah, what could be the motive, you know, if it became public, you know, they'd be laughed out of town probably.

Well, and then that's something that I was going to bring up because you you come from the DFW area, Dallas, Fort Worth, I mean, the the first articles of the Lake Worth monster, what really spurred you into looking into this as a youth from 1969? And do you find that just in general, that people are more receptive within communities like out here in Mineola, folk, stuff like that in Arkansas, as opposed to the larger cities? Well, yeah, because

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like I said, you know, you run into people that may be interested in and may have a friend or family member that's had an encounter or seen something. So, you know, being receptive to it, then, you know, somebody who lives in a high rise in Dallas, you know, maybe not, you know, is not interested. It doesn't, you know, it's not relevant to their life. Yeah,

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you know, you, you ask them the same question different ways, see if their story is consistent. If you know, if their story doesn't change, if the details, you know, you know, what time of night, did this happen? You know, sure. What was the weather conditions, you can look that up, somebody said, tells you it happened on such and such night, and there was a full moon out where you can go back, and that's not rocket math, and it's a Google and and look at that. But, you know, again, you know, you have to listen with a skeptical ear. But, you know, like I said, What's the motivation for somebody that's a professional person or law enforcement to attach their name to report when, you know, we offer, you know, anonymity. But, you know, they don't know that for a fact that their name is not going to be attached and on the internet that they saw Bigfoot. I mean, he, and, you know, I just don't know what what their motivation would be to take that chance.

And then, once again, that's a big part of it, because to consider the fact of they, they really have no vested interest, even even the interest of Okay, so I'm gonna have a book shadow written, whatever, like, the process behind that is a process in and of itself, right, you know, and the likelihood of that panning out to the extreme is pretty extreme in and of itself. Man, I want to thank you Cregg, for a lifetime of work in this field, a lifetime of research.

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And, you know, I just started out as somebody that something, had a strange encounter. And, you know, didn't have I wasn't a woodsmen. I wasn't an outdoorsman, I wasn't a hunter. But I was curious enough to go out into the woods, and do those kinds of things to try and get answers. And, you know, I've gotten some answers, but I got far, many more questions, you know, from doing it. And, you know, it's been an adventure. And, you know, the, my organization was officially, it's coming up this year would be in June will be 23 years, that is existence. And, like I said, Last year was my 20th anniversary conference in Jefferson. And, you know, and I'm at, you know, adding more events, I'm not slowing down. You know, it's, you know, Jefferson is a tourist town, and now I'm a resident there. My parents lived there since 98. And so I enjoy bringing tourists to town. Yeah. Because that town depends on it. Yeah, absolutely. And, you know, it's only a little over 2000 people and, you know, it depends on tourism, and mostly on the weekends. So, you know, whatever I can do to help the community I give. I give, just this year I awarded for Jefferson High school seniors. I awarded 11 scholarships, wow, for for Jefferson for this, the next the fall semester of college. And in Foulke, I do the same thing. And I just sent the paperwork in yesterday to the counselor at FAU High School. This year. I am every student that applied for the Texas big food scholarship or the five monster scholarship. I awarded every student a scholarship pick, but I awarded eight and found an 11 and Jefferson this year, so 19 High School students are going to get funding for their education. You know, buy Bigfoot, basically that is incredibly awesome. So, you know, I believe in giving back to the community, they've embraced it and and so you know, trying to come up with a way to give back and pay it forward. You know, if you if a college a kid can go to college and and you know, buy his books with money from the foul monster I mean, that's pretty damn cool.

man. Well tell us a little bit about your book. Tell us a little bit about you, your research everything you do.

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Of course. My name is Ron Edwards. I was born and raised in San Antonio, Texas. A little thing I like to say with my research and cryptozoology is that, you know, every little boy loves

dinosaurs loves mysteries loves animals. I guess I just never grew out of that. Yeah. And I found a world of cryptozoology, which kind of fits with everything. It's a little mystery little animals, little paleontology a little bit of everything.

Yeah. Yeah, it really is. It it's a main launch of stuff with cryptozoology because it's not just Bigfoot, it says Nick Redfern was saying this morning. It's it's Littlefoot. It's, it's, you know, pygmies, it said, there's so much rich folklore in history in that kind of stuff. So what was it that really brought you into the world of cryptozoology? What was it that really piqued your interest to begin with?

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Well, to me, I think the one memory I really have that really brought me into this world was one show on History Channel called Monster quest. Okay. I think I was watching. I had his memory is so vivid, I think it was like five years old. I was on a couch in the living room. And it was small, Chris playing knows a Thunderbird episode. Oh, yeah. And right when I think the bird flies over someone, I remember that and I'm like, wait, monsters do exist. The world is bigger than it really is. Yes. stuff out there that we haven't seen or that we've seen and we don't know about.

Yeah, yeah. And, you know, as we talked about with numerous guests here today, it's interesting to see the cultural anecdotal evidence amongst things like that, especially stuff like Thunderbirds, those are in just about every Native American lore all over the country. There have been numerous sightings of them. Even here in Texas, and not so much the Thunderbirds, but pterodactyls? Yeah. pterodactyl sightings in Texas, things like that. So really, really wild. Interesting things.

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Yes. Like a lot of people talking about cryptozoology. It's like, Sasquatch Yeti, you'd love to have thoughts. So Mike, yes, those things are super interesting. But it's just a surface. Yeah, that's like an cryptozoology really is like an iceberg. The tip of it's the odor big names, but underneath it's so much more.

Yeah. Yeah, it really is a huge just gathering of stories, folklore, things like that. What are some now? Your book cryptids of the world? Let's get into that a little bit. What are some of the topics that you get into get into in here? What was your favorite topic to cover in the book?

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I think one of my favorite topics was a phenomenon known as proto pygmies. You brought up Nick Redfern and his work with a little foot. Yep, proto pygmies is what? Researchers like Lauren Coleman and Ivan marks and Ivan T. Sanderson. They call these creature proto pygmies. Because what the sightings occur along the equatorial areas across the world, and Africa, they go by the name of Gokwe. And places like Indonesia, you have soldier obeying pandemic in South America, you have the Luke's and DD all these creatures have a very similar morphology and very similar behaviors. They're described as like, almost like a little men, but for covered and like, okay, that's kind of unbelievable, because you might a lot of people put it in the realm of like, elves and leprechauns. Yeah, but there's physical evidence behind these creatures like footprints and cultural history and code. altar will typically between different tribes about these creatures. And recently in the Sikh, I know in the 1960s, of course, Lucy was found. Yeah, the idea of human evolution was brought up and people were like, Okay, we have stories of little hairy men, and if they truly exist, so what if he's proto pygmies of creatures like Australopithecus Opra? Octopus? Yeah. survived into the modern day?

Yeah, yeah, precisely. And even even within the last couple of years, the actual finding and possibility that there may still be living hobbits. Yep. And on islands, things like that actual skeletons being found even within the last year of Dragon Man in China where we're talking a cranial volume almost twice that of its homo sapien cousins, and stuff like that. And this it's, it's not a fake fossil. It's the only one of its kind. But it has been verified and verified by numerous scientific things. Uh, yeah, this, this man was nine feet tall. And you know it to me, it just brings up people like our guest, la Marzulli that we have to talk about giants. James Keenan who's does drive research, Brad Olson, as well. Hey, you know, the stories even amongst Native American tribes, even amongst tribes in in the Middle East have red hair giants that have been there for hundreds of yours. The the actual native people of the Southwest were told to stay out of the caves by their elders because like you will be eaten. They will they will come and eat you. So yeah, these these are stories that are amongst Cultures the world over, not just the pygmies not just the little foot, Big Foot. It's really really interesting.

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Yes, like, what a Sasquatch, it's kind of a cultural phenomenon that occurs Oh cross the world and a lot of people put that out to do something called anthropomorphism. Sure humans like to see ourselves in nature. Oh, yeah. But I believe not exactly. Because there's so much evidence for it. Yeah, you have the Yeti of the Nepal you have yet the urine of China, dry of Australia, the Bukit Timo monkey man in Southeast Asia. And all these sightings have very similar morphology in the face similar behavior sets. So how are these people talking amongst each other, if there's no communication, how people in Australia talking about something that looks good.

And if there was no trade amongst tribes at the time, and their, their stories go back that far, especially whenever you're talking about Yahweh. things like that, like those are stories from

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the Aboriginal people. And as opposed to Native Americans, things like that. We know that the Aborigines trace their lineage back to literally the first men, you know, so to know that, for literally 1000s of years of spoken history, this has been their history, yes, that these things live around rainbow rock. You know, it's really, really wild to once again discount these most of the time. And for me, myself, it's it's one that, as I say, all the time, I'm more prone to believe people that have been telling the story for hundreds of years, and it's an accepted part of their culture.

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Yes, like, that's one thing when me and cryptids I look at the culture, if the indigenous population has stories of these creatures, the likelihood of them existing is very high. Yeah, if there's no Indigenous stories, and it just came around when the white man came around, yeah, then it's pious, a cultural idea that's brought with them.

Or it could even be something that, you know, tribal elders came up with in order to scare them off.

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Yes. Like I know, for instance, to take the Windigo phenomena, to Windigo. Its own native american description, something more like what we now know. It's like the rake. Oh, like, very skinny humanoid white skin. Yeah, modern day descriptions of like a antlered. Deer like animal that only came around when Anglo Saxons came into North America. And they brought their stories of werewolves came. And so is that a Windigo? Mixed with it? And now we have about an interpretation.

Yeah, yeah, precisely. We have this we have the shapeshifter creature that we have. That's almost like a skinwalker. To an extent. And like you said, very, very much in the world of lycanthropy and werewolf ism. The the accounts come to now as opposed to the traditional accounts. And now in your research have, what kind of things of course, have you found here in Texas? Because I mean, of course, you're talking about the world, but you're based out of San Antonio. So what kind of research have you done in your own backyard for cryptids?

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For instance, an eyewitness of mine talked to me about his dam here in San Antonio, there's a place called Salado Creek, and it talks about weird howling and peculiar screw You missed out here. And this is almost the middle of town. Yeah, I talked to him. Okay. Could it be coyotes and be like, No, I had no coyote house. So I did an experiment I had on YouTube. Kyle, how wolf how dog howl that I had, I think American Werewolf in London how played all four of them. And

I'm the only one that matched was one at the end. Wow, American Werewolf in London. Wow. And what I did is I went out middle night investigation just to see what it is. The likelihood of it being a creature. It's low by living in the area but what I think it's because it's a creek, I might use a creek as like a natural highway, comes up from out of town uses a lot of Creek to get in. Maybe hunts does whatever it needs to along the creek. Yeah. And one thing that's also peculiar with it is that just down the road from Motorhead to phenomenon, this hearing didn't see the creature. They have the black swan in, which is one of the most haunted places in Texas. Yeah. So correlation. Maybe, maybe not. This has two things occurred doesn't mean to coordinate it.

Sure. Sure. Absolutely. Even if they occur within the same mile of each other doesn't mean that they're correlated. And that's a really, really good point to bring up, especially whenever you're talking, citing experiences, things like that. Our last conversation was with Craig wall heater, and part of the conversation was, you know, how do you go about vetting a story? You know, how do you go about vetting somebody who's giving you an account whenever you're sitting down face to face like this? Even? And yes, I say on my show all the time, I am, I am given to always believe the story until proven otherwise. That that's just me. I myself have had my own experiences in life, spiritually, where people are like, Yeah, okay, dude. So I understand that, I get that. So I'm always more prone to understand somebody's experience and want to understand their experience and how it changed them than to discount it. But with your experiences, especially in Solano Creek, what was it like for you to, I guess, go through the investigative process? Let's kind of walk through that a minute, because I think a lot of people unfortunately see TV shows. And we talk about it regularly, especially in paranormal investigations, ghost hunts, things like that, where it's like, hey, you know, should you be using? Should you be using a laser thermometer that's not actively measuring the temperature in the air? It's measuring the surface that it's touching. Yeah. You know? Or should you be using ambient room temperature, you know, and actively catch the temperature of the cold spot that you're feeling? You know, it's one of those even even though it's hard for me to bite, and I've heard a lot of EVP, it's hard for me to bite on fully digital EVP. Because the whole concept originally back in the 1910s 1920s, when these experiments were carried out, was that the ghosts or entities were able to manipulate the weak electromagnetic field of the record head. Hey, there's a lot of things that will affect the electromagnetic field that were recorded. Yeah, so I could see that. But to be able to affect the digital ones and zeros that are representing a sound that's being a little bit harder, a little bit harder for me to buy as, as an audio engineer, like that's what I do for a living. So yeah, like, and I'm not discounting it. I'm not saying that people haven't gotten them. I would just like to see the actual science behind that. Yes. You know,



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I'm the type of guy that I really want to science behind it. Yeah. I don't discredit certain like, paranormal phenomena and a little bit more out there ideas. Sure. But I'm very much like, okay, physical scientific. Evolution. Oh, these ideas. Yeah, but I don't discredit the other side either.

Sure, sure. And they you know, that actually brings up a topic and a point of topic when it comes to cryptids. Especially, and especially when you're talking Bigfoot and other cryptids like chupacabras. Frequent accounts bring them into paranormal. Yes. And of course, paranormal is a catch all term. It literally is exactly what it says just like a UFO. It is exactly what it says until proven to be alien isn't an unidentified flying object. It's something that we don't know. So paranormal gap was something just outside of the normal. It's not something that happens to you Monday through Friday. Yes, you know, but there's a lot of tie, or a lot of people tying cryptids to the paranormal and when I say paranormal I mean, UFO sightings, UFO abduction, portals, time travel or by location. Things like that, you know, where do you stand on that as a researcher? Not not personally? And of course not spiritual seeing anybody else's belief or their concept or their paradigm of these creatures, but where do you stand on that?

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When me? I'm i not i discredit the ideas of like people thinking Bigfoot comes out of portals or anything like that. Sure. It's a possibility. No one's that expert.

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But when me I just don't have a lot of variation into it. I don't put a lot of research into that topic. Because it's almost like trying to solve a mystery within like a mystery. Yeah, yeah. Then what I like to say is like, a lot a thing a thing. And scientists correlation does not mean causation. Just because two things are occurring doesn't mean they're causing one another star.

Good friend, Steven Meyers says that all the time. Yes. All the time. Let's say

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a person is having Bigfoot sightings on their property. Yeah. And at the same time, the house is haunted. It's like, if you're a kid, and you clap your hands, and thunder, you think, Oh, I just made that happen. But with logic and you get older, you're like, Okay, no, I did it. It just happened at the same time.

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Like a lot of people will say there's no such thing as coincidence. It's, I can understand that. But sometimes, Quinton does occur

So it really is that fact of you know, you get a team like Ken Gerhard and Daniel Allen Jones out in the field. We got 25 hours in which to conduct some research guys, what is our focus? Yes. What are we devoting time to what are we devoting money and energy to

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Yes, I have maybe like two teams or one specialized shirt everything Yes, realizes. But if you're out there looking for five different things, you're not gonna find any of them cuz you're

suffering your time you know? Yeah, focusing on one certain aspect. Yeah,

Yeah, because he focused on one particular thing a lot of scientists worry about one particular thing Yeah, they don't have a shotgun blast and always right fields. They might know a little bit of everything that but they don't specialize in all these different all these fields right? Because heck, the human brain can only hold so much information Yeah, and you can do only so much critical thinking

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with me I try to come along with like anything for physical evidence. Like, for instance, like if I do a Bigfoot research, I might do plaster casts like like plaster with me. Sure. Of course, like anything that's I like to say anyone who wants to go out do and do research. Think so if you're gonna go out camping for a week? Yeah, like anything you would bring like survival gear, and things for like a tent, things like that. Especially plan for the worse. Yes, because a lot of people talk about survival situations. Don't let a Bigfoot hunt turn into a survival situation. Yeah,

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And one thing I always say to is, don't let emotions run high. Like, if you're on a research trip, and let's say you hear rustling in the bushes. You don't go chase after it or something like that. Yeah, you don't let your emotions take control. Always think logically, always think, Okay, what's the safest thing I can do here.

Let's stop and look at it. Is that your practice out in the field? No, thank you. Thank you,

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that I do what it is like, okay, with, especially with Sasquatch, it's a it's a smart creature. It knows when you're watching it. If you stop and watch it, it's gonna walk away. Yeah, I say ignore until it comes closer. Yeah, ignore because the more it's with you, the more evidence

you can capture. Well, yeah, yeah. If it's, I'm just hearing in the distance, okay? How's it walking with a walk and get type of behaviors? Can I try to infer from what I'm hearing or what I'm

Now, if you're right, or you're wrong, am I feeling okay, let's, let's see, what what did we actually see? It's only literally since the public announcement of the A tip program. Oh, yeah. That it actively became okay for a pilot to report only then was it if you see something, say something, until then is if you say something, we will take your license revoked your flight just shut

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up about, ya know, and that was probably the biggest takeaway. Well, actually, I had a lot of takeaways from the book. But the the thing that struck me the hardest was, I think a majority of people have had a lot of these encounters. I did not have to look hard and, you know, look hard to find people who'd seen things. I should have asked random people questions. I think the majority of people have actually had an encounter, but they will not come forward. For that reason.



Yeah. And even within families. Oh, absolutely. Now, when you were researching and writing Metroplex monsters have your number one I unders, I would have to understand that you're from the DFW area. Yes, sir. Just for those of you who are not from Texas, or do not know what the Metroplex is, that is a Dallas Fort Worth metroplex. But tell us a little bit about your experiences, gathering these stories, the accounts that you got, and some of the things that you found right there in your own backyard? Well,

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so the starting point is I had my own encounter when I was 12. And honestly, I didn't talk, I didn't even talk about it. Again, going back to your point I didn't even talk about with my family. I just really, you know, it took me a long time before I started in terms of like that I've had my encounter. And so once I started, decided I needed to write this book, I had taken some time off of work to really see if I could do this. And so I was once a lot of people were made public what I was doing. A lot of people I'd known for 20 years, just came forward and said, Okay, we need to talk about what happened to me when I was 15. I was just out of college. And so a lot of the stories just came to me. But then while I was out doing research in the area, like for the lake Granbury monster, which is called Owen, I went up to take photographs, and you know, just get a feel for the lake, that kind of thing. I just started asking random people questions. And what was funny is how often people would tell me things like, Oh, I didn't know there was a monster like, but I did have this one in this weird encounter. Right? So it's really like, half the stories can't just came to me for people I've known for a long time. Wow. But then the other half was just I would go to the area and just walk around and talk to people and say, Hey, I've seen something weird. Yeah, that's it. And then they would tell me and then they would they're like, yes. And they would in like you said, What was weird is how often people didn't have a name for it. Or they didn't know there was a old one. I le Granberry. They just knew they'd had this weird encounter with this thing. Yeah, yeah. They didn't know that. They were they didn't know that. They were living tears were seen in North Texas, but they saw one. Yeah. You know, so it was a lot of stuff like that.

Yeah. And we were just talking about the pterosaurs just a minute ago, with Ryan and yeah, that was one of those that I remember when those reports happened. Even the presentation earlier that Daniel Alan Jones gave one of the first scripted things that I guess I ever heard of was the NASA gargoyle. Yeah, I grew up in Houston on the on the west side of Houston. And yeah, even even going to school. In Irving over new grapevine, like I I fished that lake that you're talking about numerous times when I was in college and after and I don't think I ever heard of a cryptid story out there. So even to know that right there in my own backyard where I spent quite a bit of time in my life that was right there. And I had no idea

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Well, and that's the whole thing. Like I I didn't say anything for well over 20 years because I didn't believe I could have seen what I saw. Because even though after I knew people had seen pterosaurs in Texas, but that's well south, I mean, Dallas is hundreds of miles away from the

border. Yeah, right. It's like well, that's not that's down there. That's not up here. This is one of the largest conurbations in the country. There's these Things don't live here. I've never heard of anything being around here. They must not be here. And so that's a lot of this is just comes down to, you know, to perception.

Sure, sure. And now, what was your? What was your experience that led you down this?

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It was a pterosaur. Wow. Yeah. No, it was 12. It was in the 10 mile creek. And for those who don't know, you know, northern North Texas and southern Oklahoma basically settled on this giant limestone slab.

So a lot of our quarters you bet. Exactly.

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Yeah, essentially, the ocean decided, Oh, wait, I'm in Texas. I need to go somewhere else. Yeah. And so we were left with all this limestone. So the thing is, a lot of our rivers and creeks are cut into this limestone bed and the 10 mile creek is one of those, like 10 Most places is 1520 feet into this limestone that's very, very wide and in some places. So we just finished you know, fishing, it was summer. He. So key thing the key element is a lot of these are very sheer cliffs. But there are places where the walls collapse, right. And so you can get in and looks like a little rocky bank, and you can fish and do whatever you want. It was a lot of fun growing up in the area. But my friend had already left I had already packed up it's about 10 in the morning. And I had just got inside the tree line. When I hear a noise there was a call I did not recognize just something. I was like what is going on. So I poked my head out from the treeline. And at first I think I'm looking at the largest blue heron I've ever seen in my life. Eight to 10 foot wingspan because I can see the walls Yes, the right colors are the pains gray. Yeah. But once because I'm elevated now. It gets right in front of my face. Literally. It's right wing tip is five feet from my face. Wow. It's just flying. And I look at and that's when I realized, Oh, I'm looking at something that doesn't have feathers. And what I thought had been enslaved. So you know from behind, it was actually a flange tailor a flange. Again, think of a long reptilian tail. But then at the very end, having like a diamond shed like a paddle. Yeah, like a spade head. And that's when I realized what I was looking at was a pterosaur. Wow. And I was like, and then I was basically in the middle of the straightaway

Now was it at that moment? Or was it later in life that you realize? That was what you were like, I

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was very much into dinosaurs. Okay, so I knew what I was like, it was not like I was looking at a terrorist. But I didn't, I didn't really think of things like the rent like a ramp for incus or whatever. I'm like, should have a tail. Because again, like most of us, I was, you know, I love dinosaurs. But I was more into the popular ones. So yeah, you think tariffs are you think Tirana Don right? That's what they have in the Flintstones. And Jurassic Park is where you know, they haven't all those movies. So I saw it. I watched it, basically straightaway. So I got a good look at it right here in front of me then as it just goes and banks and disappears from my life. I went home pulled out this massive book of dinosaurs I had, I'm flipping through it. I'm like, What did I see? Because at that point, I'm still being traded on so they have, you know, they have swoop on the press, oh, they've got to beat this didn't have a beat. And they didn't have tails. And I was like, Oh, it's a ramp for it. It's one of it's a ramp for ENCODE. You know, it's one of those fat it's a ramp for enjoyed family. Because it had it didn't have a beak and had a face. You know, like, again, Reptilians Yes, now did. And it had a long flange down. Like, that's what I'm looking at. But I was like, Okay, I knew people had seen pterosaurs in South Texas at that point, because I was already sort of into a lot of this stuff. But I'm like, that's not that's not here. This is hundreds, hundreds of miles away. My brain could not wrap the wrap around the idea that this thing was here, where I live, you know, that's for strange, exotic places like Loch Ness, or, you know, the Congo or San Antonio.

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And if you'd asked me this, even a few years ago, I would have said, No, I don't really think much of it. But it's only in retrospect, I can go back and say, Oh, I can see how it affected me. Because I had the story. I couldn't even I didn't even tell my dad and my dad would have believed me. Sure. It's like, I didn't believe myself for 20 years. And that's why I was I started. I was always open to somebody else's story. Yeah. Because I realized I had a story that I didn't believe it was incredible, even to me. Yeah. So it's like it. And I'm like, Okay, well, the first thing I did was like the first little booklet I wrote, was was using artwork and our history to prove that the RAM factoids had lived into their area. Recently, there's ways of doing that. Again, I won't go into all the details here, but you can use sort of our history to prove this. And again, the program's I'm on the they tend to lean more towards Bigfoot and stuff like that. Sure. I am more interested in the pterosaurs for for a number of reasons. One, they're the reptiles. You know, you could argue with that Sasquatch, as intelligent as a human is, but it's clearly smart enough to stay away from us and actively. Yeah, I don't think that's what's happening with the ramp factoids? I think that what they are doing is they're just living their lives. They are mostly nocturnal. By their I have several broad daylight sightings, but it's early. It's early mornings before noon, at least. Okay. Right. But they are, they do appear to be mostly nocturnal. They are not so outlandishly large, at least the ones in North Texas. Yeah, that they stand out immediately in their coloration is either a dull red or a or a Payne's Gray. I think we're seeing sexual dimorphism when you when you look at the different colors, and some have had crests small headdress, some don't I think we're looking at sexual dimorphism with their but the way they fly right they do the S curve thing with their neck like this way a crane will I think they look so much like cranes when they fly. That when most people see them, they don't recognize what they're they just think it's a crane. They move on. That's what I did in literally everyone I've spoken to said. I thought it was a heron. I thought it was a pelican carrying something. I got ones that I thought it was now because it's because she saw it at night. It came right by her car. It wasn't until it was in the headlights that she realized this. She's like it's a dinosaur. Okay, technically now the dinosaurs the reptiles. Yeah, most from the average person. There's a dinosaur.

Yes. And that's just it was a mid step point between the two. But even with that being said, especially whenever you're talking about this critter, specifically in lunch, it's now the first thing that pops into my head. Is Jersey Devil. Yeah. Oh, no, absolutely.

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Yeah. And that's actually one of the things one of the conclusions I've come to is I think The Jersey Devil is the RAM factoid and I think people saw it. And the thing is, we will most people say okay, well, the The Jersey Devil looks like this weird thing over here. It's like no, that is what a an artist in a newspaper artist in Philadelphia, who did not take this series.

Yeah. Made. Most of them have almost a horse shaped head, like a like a pony ship, Ted, things like that. 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Yeah. In the blood. It's now a blood sound against the lung again. The bifurcated tail. Yeah. Right. It's when you look at it's like, okay, the problem is, when most people describe something, describe what they know. Yeah. People did not know what dinosaurs were back then. So they did they were just trying to describe what they knew. And this, we see this throughout history as well. You go back and look at a lot of these older, you know, dragons, or even the unicorn, right? Yeah, what they're doing is they are describing something in their own context. And if you take what they're saying, seriously, not literally. But seriously, you can reconstruct what they're looking at. One of my favorite versions of this is actually the cockatrice Yeah, yeah, it's like this. It's the weirdest looking dragon you ever seen. But if you stop and realize what they're saying, it's a it's a dragon supposed to be half chicken half dragon. Yeah. Okay, that's weird. Well, but that's only because we've only now realized that last theropods had feathers. Right? So if you're banging around Persia, yeah, 3000 years ago, and you see something like an oval Raptor. Right. It has a beak. It's a theropod, which means it probably had feathers, but not completely covered in feathers. It's just what do you I mean, how would you describe that? Yeah, it's

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Yeah, it's like, it's like it's a chicken. That's also a dragon. Right? That's it. That's the only thing you're gonna come up with. It's absolutely a way to describe especially whenever you're looking at I guess the modern day equivalent whenever you're talking about these colorations it'd be like a castle weary Oh, absolutely. And it's very prominent is like, like, even look at the originals. The chickens we have today are not the chickens that start off. You go look at the jungle fowl that the chickens were bred out of. They're very colorful, oh, hugely colored. And they're really actually they're quite pretty. But it goes back to the whole point is you have some guy who's you know, they have chickens. And they you know, they you have the dragon mythos and you see something like an overwrapped

or just some of the theropod you're that's that's the only thing you have to say. So the problem is if you take it seriously, but not literally the neurons that are just trying to convey information. And we see that all throughout history. Sure. Even the dragon that's on the Ishtar Gate, right and very, very famously, it's like, okay, that doesn't look like any dinosaur. We know. But you have to remember the artists didn't actually see it. Yeah, he is simply or, you know, they were, were simply trying to recreate what they had been told. And when you do that, you're always okay, what you're looking at is something that has bird like feet, but, you know, sharp front claws. Yeah. Okay, we're, you know, there's any number of theropods that could have been again, longer neck, it's like, Okay, this looks like a number of dinosaurs that we have the fossil that we have in the fossil record. But we just because we say they they died off millions of years ago. And the book is closed on that. We never entertained the idea that they have survived in modern times. Oh,

well, and the plein air bring up regularly on the show, especially in the last two years is don't forget, last year, we were still locked down in a pandemic whole world.
