And what this program is, is for anybody, because this gentleman went over to Africa, and learned from the last real truckers who live that way, who provide their food that way. They can't read and write, but we need to learn for them to keep this alive. But to help with poaching. Yep. Yeah, so he learns from them for years and years. But he realizes he can't help them with the poaching issue, if they can't read and write in the sense of recording data. So they create this cyber unit, where they just use icons, these people can use for their poaching issues, who and conservation and you know, species and numbers, because we know in in all regions of the world and conservation, they don't go and count how many Cougars are in the area. They count the tracks and they learn the tracks of individuals. That's how we get numbers. Yeah, so they brought the program back to the United States. and implemented it all over the world. Because you can be a fifth grader. You don't have to read or write. Yeah, but you can help observation.

certified cyber specialist of North America and Africa. And he works with me for nine months in tents. I go to take my certification. Everybody there had just been through a onsite wildlife school for nine months with his with a certified tracker. I'm the one that's going to fail. And it was the hardest thing I ever did was two days. Wow, the field they didn't know what they were going to find. But they would do like anything from insects. Yep. All the way up to big animals, birds, all of this, you know, i The hardest thing I had to do is identify snail poop. You know, walking stick tracks, all those things. I remember my, my mentor says, Shall you need to learn about rodent skulls? Because if they find an owl pellet, they're gonna break it open and ask you to identify the rodent in the pellet. Because certain animals eat certain rabbit salutely. Those are all important things. Anyway, second day, I get a level too. Nice. So citizen science are things that people already say they do. But tracker, I'm a hunter. Yeah, go get certified. Because the guy that gave me my test is the head of the Endangered Species biologist for the state of Texas. And he's a specialist. And he promotes this program for everybody to cool. So I encourage citizen science so much because it's it's fun. You are you are actually adding to things you care about because I know people that love Bigfoot, love all wildlife. And you're going to learn so much by opening up mind getting into those details. Practice, practice, practice, practice, practice. Yep. And yeah, so I could talk forever and it rarely well. Sorry.

And when I was older, slightly older is only eight or nine years old, I got hit by a motorbike that was driving illegally on a sidewalk allow. They told me I'd never walk again. And I was determined to walk again. So after a year or so, I became my city swim champ champion. So I knew I had lots of determination. I'd always love to go outdoors and do research now is interested in the adventure aspect of phenomena of unexplored creatures. So wedded survival courses, things like that. So it's a gradual progression, got to know my local woods and then explored from there. So it was it's always been a childhood dream shaped by some rather unpleasant experiences when I was a kid, which moves me towards those and doing why I enjoy.

Well, it's a good question, but not really in the first instance. So most of my expeditions were self financed, okay. I mean, things like the Congo, i There's no film company with me, I saved up to do it on my own time and my own money. And nearly everything I've done has been on my own time and my own money. When I do do a film, of course, they pay for it. And that's great. But but it was years before they got involved. And most again, now most of the stuff I do is is what I pay for, because I passionately believe in it, and I enjoy it. I think the best advice I can give somebody I mean, I do expeditions all over the world, but I do have an interest in Bigfoot. So I think the best advice I can give to somebody who is starting out is to really learn their local woods, learn the flora and fauna, do the background research, not everything, you know, and don't be you know, it's not like the TV in the sense that everything is a pop and a crack and a big four. Yeah, I mean, you know, most of the stuff I do is involved in element of suffering and it's hard field work. And there's very little substantive evidence that you find over years of research.

To come out and say, though, don't be upset if you come back from like, research trip number 25. And you still have nothing?

There was one in Vancouver Island, I think, which was, which was very impressive, but I didn't see it, do it. And I think you know, you need to be aware that the, you know, unless you, I mean, people will say, Well, you know, I put some food out for a pig and some animal creature must be a pig for the turkey. Well, did you actually

see that happen? Yeah, you know, so I'm cautious because I can say, well, you know, I've had these experiences, but unless I physically observe it, and it's, it's a really good sighting. I can't say for sure.

I got this old data out and I just saw here You know, his little thing thing is I got out and I thought I was going back to Britain for Christmas. And I thought there's that man staying there. There's a truly good man. Yeah, I try my best, but I'm not that man. And so I think that will always be the single thing that sticks in my head most.
