And where I was, I was working the classic game fest here in Austin and ran across you, in your booth with literally the first iteration of this.

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Yeah, before actually before it was an actual app, it was. So I'd spent the first year trying to understand how people actually interacted with virtual reality. So we had, we had built a bunch of what we called like a lab. So people would get controllers and I would watch how they would utilize them. We had some really cool interactions, and I was convinced that was all going to be in our app. But when people put a headset on they they were so not used to that experience that and they couldn't understand what a controller was for and why they would do that. You put the headset on the handle controllers. Yeah, it was it was jarring to them. So we had to start taking features out and features out till it was just like, this works for everybody. Yeah, but yeah, so back back in the day, man, you saw the vision. And I can't tell you how much I appreciate it

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to see it now. Because I remember you brought it to the studio. It was Steven's birthday. Yeah. We it was it was his birthday episode. And he got to go through it, all that kind of stuff. And I remember that. Yeah, that being the case. And even whenever forever

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to set up. We had to use a computer and there was cables. It was on the Yes, yeah, it

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was ridiculous. And I mean, I remember I had a decent time with it. Because I had done some previous VR stuff, right VR experiences in the music world, where things were like, you could basically step into, like Abbey Road Rehearsal Studios and play around is pretty cool stuff. It really is. But to see where you've come now with this, it's beautiful man, it really is.

Thank you. And if anyone would understand it, it would be you, you have seen every iteration. And as you know this, like, like you're saying earlier, now we have these boxes, that we literally send out the box contains every single thing that you would need to to educate people about the topic comes with the Oculus quest, one headset, which these things have gone down from \$300, which when you would buy them brand new, they would come with controllers, and people break the controllers and buying and you can't buy new ones now. So they just generally upgrade to a quest two, and this thing goes in the garbage. And so now people are selling these on eBay for \$40. So I can get these headsets out to people really easily. And then to use it, you can only use one at a time when you're teaching people but to be able to buy, you know, five headsets for a couple of \$100. It's insane. So we can now get that we can get this product out. And the reason that it really, the reason that we can do that is that we design

it to not need controllers. So you can start the app easily by just pressing the pressing one button on the headset. And then when you're finished with it, you just turn it off, turn it back on. It's phenomenal.

So it's like a meta meta quest developer hub that you can download on there. So it's, it's doesn't hurt your device. And if you wanted to install it on your own, you can just factory reset it and get it started back up again. Yeah, and

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once again, that the accessibility of this for people now is phenomenal. And I think more than anything, man, when I saw you show up with that box, in my front door today. The thing is, now it's an actual product.

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Yeah, that's what it definitely feels like a product, you know,

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whereas before and nothing. And we've had numerous side conversations about this as iterations have happened and part of the hurdle was getting people to understand the need for the product, and what it was and understanding the the medium of connection between virtual reality and instructions,

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right. It's what we found, though, so kind of just to give people an idea of what's going on. So the the device actually runs a it's a completely interactive narrative story where you Um, you get to meet a, well, you embody this young girl, and she tells you how her life was affected by trafficking and how she met somebody online. They took advantage of her need for affection and love. So she's posting on her social media, you know, the problem she's having with her family, and someone comes up and performs what they call an interview. And so they find out what your weaknesses are and what you need. And then they promise those things to you. And then of course, they trick you, et cetera. And so this learning are trying to come up with a story

for this thing that would be able to be that would connect with people, it took me about a year to go around and talk to people and make sure that I really understood the psychological aspects of it, because that was really the thing. And the more that I've learned about trafficking, the more I learned that everything is about vulnerabilities, everything. And so if you can't acknowledge or recognize that you have vulnerabilities, you're not going to, you're not going to be able to stay safe, and you're not going to know what's going on with other people. And so this, this experience makes you confront your own vulnerabilities. Now that you've shown on the website, how you can get you can get yourself a bot. It's

It's so fantastic, man. It just just to see this on the website is is so great. Oh, great. That's fantastic. And, you know, let's, let's go ahead and get into, I guess, the the horrible world of trafficking real quick belly. One of the things that I brought up that we were talking about beforehand, y'all have y'all have recently joined with your first Native American tribe, we are Appleseed pros. Oh,

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excited about that. I actually, as you recall, I had gone to Standing Rock. And while I was there, I listened to the Native American leaders of a number of different tribes, or nations. And they were talking about, you know, how much America is kind of is failed on all of its promises to our indigenous? And then they say yes, slightly. And then they said that, they, they knew that everyone that had come there is going to go home, and they're like, will you please remember us and go make a difference when you get home? Whatever that difference is. And then the next thing they started talking about was murdered and missing Indigenous women. And I was like, Okay, I knew I needed to do this. But that pushed me over the edge. Yeah. And so knowing that, that is, that's when my, my wife and I decided that we were going to sell the house and use the money to start the nonprofit instead of another video game studio to make more SpongeBob games. Yeah. And so having met with a number of a number of Native American groups, we finally got the first one over the finish line. And they are the Puyallup Tribe, and they're up in Tacoma, Washington, or Spokane, Washington, I'm sorry. And they have a number of groups that they want us to work with, once we get once we get going with them, and they just got their headsets and they just got them all set up, and they're sending them out to their to their big group. And then we have, I don't want to go into the list of names of the other groups, because if it doesn't happen, I always feel bad about that. But there we are working with a number of different Native American groups. And as I was describing to you, you know, one of the things that's really difficult for us is finding someone that really feels like they need a product like this to make a difference, and they're willing to take a chance. And Native American groups are having such a problem with murdered and missing Indigenous women and children, that it's unbelievable. And so they are recognizing that the training that they have been doing over the years is not making a difference, it is not changing things. And so they're ready and willing to make a change and do something different. And that's what we're really looking for is places that have been trying to make a difference and realizing that they need something else. And we want to be that product that helps the

world in a you know, that that has been a point of conversation between us for a long time is that point of understanding that the curricula that exist not that there aren't is some things out there for the hotel industry through that kind of stuff. I mean, even in schools, it may be the fact that it's mentioned. And then it's gone, like 40 minutes later, you know, there may be like a topical segment of a day of training for teachers, you know, whenever it's talking about inappropriate touching, and, you know, be careful of this, keep your eye out for abuse kids, these are some of the signs, that kind of stuff, but it's not like

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it's not thorough. Yeah, it's really not. My my partner, David deeds, or Dr. David D. Just got his doctorate in education. He actually did his Capstone work on on training inside of university level training. So we there's actually we posted as posted his His Capstone up on our page and did some Al artwork for it just so y'all know, because we were just talking about that earlier, to have some filler wanted to have some pretty stuff, right. But the the problem, if you will, is that people don't want to teach about trafficking unless they know the topic backwards and forwards. So they're almost afraid of it. And so he teaches in two universities, each is criminal justice in a college page and Governor State University up near Chicago. And the people that taught it. They taught it because there was a couple of paragraphs about it inside of their book, but no one is making that mandatory in their university training, even from the police. And they say this is the second largest, you know, crime in the world on the planet. And they're not teaching our police about this. Like I sit on coalition's, and we have nurses, that, you know, they're in there, and you're like going, you know, what brought you into this field. And they're like, well, after I graduated, my first year's training that I had to take actually included something about trafficking. And we're like, the whole, the whole coalition is like, what what do you didn't learn anything about this the whole time you were in medical school? And they're like, No, it's not taught. And so if it's not happening in criminal justice, and it's not happening in, you know, in nursing and medical places, which 88% of victims say they see a provider while they're being trafficked, and they're not being they're not being seen literally, for this. If you think that it's not happening in there, what do you think is happening in schools and high schools and middle schools? No, it's like, they can't even talk about sex ed, much less what's going on with trafficking. And, and I want to say that trafficking is a bullseye of all the badness, you know, whether it's manipulation or abuse, or sexual abuse or psychological abuse, it's like trafficking is like this crazy crazy. It is, it is the nexus of horrifying Eve, right? And so the schools are supposed to I know, they're supposed to be reporting sexual assault and sexual abuse, and, you know, those kinds of things happening in schools. And, and they don't even know what trafficking is. I mean, we've been to schools and, you know, trained kids on our VR experience, and the kids actually disclose what has been happening in their school and the previous years. I mean, we had two children. That had been, well, the kids that we had come out and done the training with us, they actually disclosed that there were two kids than the previous year that have been trafficked. One was being sex trafficked by her, her stepfather, and the other was taken to, to Mexico for an operation and their parents sold one of her kidneys. And the parent, the the teachers that were in the room, were just like, Oh, my God, and then they started running in their head, they were like, I should have thought about that, oh, my gosh, she had this sign this sign and this sign and this sign, and the other one had this sign and this sign, they're like, how did we not know. And we find this constantly. We have a group that's in Montana that uses our, our software. And they go, and they train bankers to look for labor trafficking inside of spreadsheets, so they can they can find it. It's weird. And the way that I mean, there's all sorts of techniques, I've taken a class on it. But they also, they also

go and they train at hospitals. And so they say they take our VR thing inside of the emergency room to train these people. And they get about five minutes into it. And they are what was they described as ugly crying. I mean, they're just gasping for air. And they're like, there was someone here yesterday that I should have recognized and it just changes their lives. So it's like, we have been getting fantastic feedback from on the job stuff. Same thing with police. And, you know, you know, all the all the trades it

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is it is definitely I will say just in the time that I've known you, and maybe it's the fact that I'm more aware, because I know you and it's a cause I'm behind now, but I traveled for a while before you and I met. And I definitely did not see the trafficking signs the way I do now. Right, where you go into the hotel bathroom, and you'll see them on the inside of stalls.

It's shocking how important those are. I mean, like, yeah, May after you've seen them, you're like, oh, okay, I know where their sticker. So many people, whether they're still a victim, or are a survivor, and there's a lot of thoughts on what you call somebody, but I mean, they're all survivors if they're still alive for crying out loud, but they say that they never saw anything, you know, and no stickers, no help thing people don't even ask them if they're okay. It's like, it's like literally like they're invisible and you're just like, I can't even imagine that. But having a sticker, you know, somewhere that says, look, there's someone that wants to help you. Yeah, that really is a lifeline for them. So it's something just as some Bull is a sticker.

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Yeah. Crazy. Yeah. Yeah, absolutely. And once again, just to raise the awareness, I think, because you were saying a minute ago, the police don't really do a whole lot, things like that. I think most of that, as we've discussed numerous times before, it comes from the fact that people misunderstand what trafficking is. I think most police whenever they hear the term trafficking, the first thing they think of is human smuggling, like, oh, well, that should be, you know, customer. Yeah, that's Customs and Border Patrol. Right? Oh, that's

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orange today's decking, they think that it's a federal offense, and the feds are supposed to do something about it, when in when in actuality, it's a local law enforcement problem. And one of the problems that you have, and I should probably describe what trafficking is legal, yeah, that stuff, but they know that if they go and they bust that farmer, that's, you know, labor trafficking, all these immigrants that are on their land, it's like that person, they know them personally. So it's like this really messed up societal, you know, thing. And we're all built in this world economy where we're on a race to the bottom to get the cheapest labor, or the the cheapest everything to put the, you know, to make the most profit, without considering, you know, the human cost. I could go on and on. But so to describe what trafficking is, so there's a there's a law in the United States called the Trafficking Victims Protection Act, it was passed in

20, as passed in 2000. And it describes three requirements for something to be considered trafficking. And that is, something has an action and a means and a purpose. And that's it, those are confusing words. But an action is basically having control over a person. The means would be somebody being mean to you almost really, so it's like, they force force you they trick you, or they coerce you into doing something, and that something the purpose, the action means in purpose, the purpose is to take advantage of you financially for through your labor or through sex, which is also labor, if you think about it, yeah. So it's like action means in purpose, they they get you to provide them value by your effort against your will. So that's trafficking. You know, people that are sex workers, that's not trafficking, if they've decided to do it themselves. You know, there's any any number of things but they get tricked into this stuff. And one of the big one of the big ones, and we're, I've done a ton of research on domestic servitude recently, because we're doing another VR product on that. And that has been so enlightening. But what happens is people come over to America, they get, they get a visa, through a recruiter. And these recruiters promise to get you a job in America. And what they do is they charge you a ton of money so that you can sit they'll get you the get you the visa, they'll get you the job, they'll get you a flight overseer America, yeah. And then basically, they extort you for, you know, an exorbitant amount of interest, all that stuff. And in fact, a lot of countries, people, they mortgage their homes or their land, you know, for to cover those recruiting fees. And then when they get to America, surprisingly, these are the people that are supposed to be their employers take their take their passport away from them. And then they threatened to call the police and have them taken away. Or it goes from an eight hour a day job to 16 hours a day. And the person that is that has the visa or has come over on a visa, they can't change jobs while they're here. They have to go back and get a whole new visa to start another job. And which of course goes back to the recruiter and the recruiter charges them a whole bunch more money. And now they're in debt. You know, forever. Yeah. It's crazy. Yeah.

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And that's in a cycle of servitude. Yeah.

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And that's, and that's just, you know, labor trafficking. And of course, you know, sometimes sex trafficking gets involved in all that stuff, as well. It's, it's bananas. And apparently, you know, one of my advisors, he's done a ton of research on the visa system. And he said that during COVID, it got worse. It made it harder for people to change jobs. So it just made him a trafficking that much. While not to mention the fact that, you know, a lot of people that were that were being sex trafficked, they were put into incredibly risky situations during COVID as well. So yeah, yeah, crazy. What I mean, it's an awful topic. It really is. But, you know, the things that we want people to do is just, you know, pay attention to their own vulnerabilities and recognize when they're put themselves in a situation like, if somebody runs away from home, you know, you're going to need a place to stay eventually, and survival sex is the number one thing and then then you're trading your body for sex. And then of course, somebody has something on top of you. And then that could that could lead to just horrible stuff and these people are They're professionals. This is their job. They literally hang out in places where people that are having these vulnerabilities are going to be exhibiting them like at a bus station or you know any of that stuff. Yeah, they just look for somebody that's station shopping malls.

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Yeah, all that kind of stuff, places, places where you can go hang out for six, seven hours, and nobody's gonna love you.

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And the these people can see your weakness, just like, you know, a lion can see the weakest antelope. And they go, and they perform what is what is known as an interview. And they are looking for, you know, oh, oh, you're from out of town. Oh, you don't have friends here in town, oh, you're you're hungry, you haven't had anything to eat for a while. It's like, if you can just get people to acknowledge that they have vulnerabilities. Even when you're having problems, you know, feeding your family, you don't have a job, you might be tempted to go do something risky. Yeah. And sometimes it's like, there'll be a job that's like, wow, I can make \$10,000 a month doing absolutely nothing. You're like going, yeah, maybe that's not quite as good as you think it is, there might be a catch in there. So you have to acknowledge that you have these vulnerabilities. And that's probably the biggest thing that can teach somebody. Yeah, you know, just pay attention. If you realize that you're making some bad decisions, because of some financial situation in your life, you're like, maybe I should start paying extra attention to how how I'm making my decisions.

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Well, and even you know, as the parent of a young child, I remember. And we've talked about this probably every time I've had you want the situation with my niece, that happened many years ago, on social media, like I saw, it happened in front of my eyes, where a dude who ended up being a guy in his mid 30s. You know, my, my niece had lost a couple friends, to drunk drivers, she lost one to suicide. We just all kinds of things happened. And this guy was basically like, hey, you know, if you ever need to talk or anything like that, don't don't hesitate to come, you know, if there was just something about it that skeeved me out. And I called my brother and I was like, Hey, man, you look to look at her timeline today, because you really should watch this dude on here that like, I don't know, he's just talking from, from my experience as a youth minister, not really talking the way that a parent a concerned parent,

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that is, you can tell it's appropriate. Yeah. You

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know, like, if it was like one of her friend's parents, it would have been approached in a different way than the way this dude approached it. And my brother started deep diving into the students timeline. And yeah, he had like, a couple of 100 friends, most of them under the age of 20. Most of them between the ages of 15 and 19. And he messaged him, like directly was like, Hey, I see you commented on my daughter's timeline, you need to go away now.

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I had my daughter put up a LinkedIn profile. And within 24 hours, she had a guy creeping on her. And I think she was 16 or something when we put that thing up. And I was just like, I was like, police. Yeah, are you talking about,

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hey, you know, I'm not gonna lie, we had a scare with my son. All of a week ago, I believe. He loves his games, loves his tablet. We have we have parental permissions on the tablet for purchases, things like that, all that kind of stuff. But if one of the games that you've already given permission to whenever you purchased it has, has a team function that you don't know about

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teams chat.

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That was it. He was sitting there. And you know, don't get me wrong. He's five years old. He's got his imaginary friends. He talks with mouse, all kinds of stuff. You know, man, and it's pretty much there's just a dialogue all day long. With the boy.

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That's awesome. It's great.

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But this one is typical dialogue, you know, where he's talking himself through his game. And I was like, Are you talking to me? He's like, my team. Like,

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you're like, do you mean your team? There's teams in that. And

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so yeah, we had to have a stern conversation and get rid of the game. You know, things like that. But yeah, it's it's just that easy. And all it takes is somebody on the team recognizing,

well, that dude sounds like he's five. Hey, buddy.

These people are patient. They keep records of people. They learn everything about you what time you're awake, we know what city that you're in. When you get off of school. It's really just disgusting to find out what it is that they do. And they, like I said, they're patient. You remember we talked to Chung, and she had, she had a guy that she fell in love with. And her family that met him, he came at dinner, and he was going to take her away to go meet his family to get married, and then wham, takes her and sells her off to a trafficking group. It's insane how how well organized, some of these people are Yeah. And you know, it's one of the things that we try to get people to understand in our online course, which of course, is we have human trafficking essentials, we have a free version, or you can choose your own price. We have a certificate version that we guarantee anyone will accept. And then we just and this is I'm so excited about this. We now have Belhaven University actually provides PLC credit. So you can actually get university credit from our same course. And then I see you're on the page. So yeah, the Texas hospitality course just became live. So now, you can actually, you can learn what it is you're supposed to know if you're an employee in the Texas hospitality industry. So if you have more than 10 beds, you should all of your all your employees within 90 days of employment should be getting trained. And it's an annual requirement. But yeah, nobody's nobody's doing that either, honestly, because there's no reason there's no teeth to that law, which is again, just another challenge. And we'll get there eventually.

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We have We have numerous laws in place for sweatshops. We have numerous laws in place for, you know, making sure that immigrants are not taken advantage of and kitchens, all kinds of things a lot. Instead thing, never really enforced. No, not really enforced.

So it's like, I'm, I hope I don't I mean, I Yes, I'm

frustrated by all this stuff. But it's like, I'm doing everything I can to produce the best material in the best way possible working with this. There's many experts across the world. And I get shot down by people that do not even have a list of what it is that they're that their staff are supposed to learn. A police don't know either. Yeah. It's crazy. Yeah, you know, dude, what is it in food prep? It's like, wash your hands, you know, don't be sick. You know? Yeah, put the chicken away, you

I love that question. So I really spent a lot of time trying to figure out what it was that we were going to put inside of the experience and what the learning objectives are. And I worked with a number of instructional designers. And the first thing they said was like, Look, you have to define your learning objectives. And I was like, Okay, I don't even know what that is. And so I

had to do a ton of research on that, and then try to figure out what the learning objectives ought to be. So I went to the top, all of the top anti trafficking groups and I took, I made a list of all of their red flags, all of their all the risks all the vulnerabilities, and then I forced rank them with a particular emphasis on Polaris, because they're like one of the they're like the National Human Trafficking Hotline group. And so it's like, I wanted to make sure all of theirs were in there. And so I made a list and I have the I have the spreadsheet, actually, that you can see. And it has like a list of all these learning objectives. And then on the right hand side, every line of dialogue that mentions those things, or the scene that you're in. So one of the one of the biggest, one of the biggest things is like you have to get people to understand that this could happen to anyone anywhere. So the very first thing the VR thing opens up with is you're in. Well, that's the get people used to the to the VR part, but you start off in the suburbs, and it's like, why am I in the suburbs? And it's like, Well, you're in the suburbs, because this happens everywhere. So she talks about what it's like to have freedom and just being being able to be a kid. And I found out that this is this kind of environment is what people need. So they kind of get brought into the VR experience of what it's like to be in VR. So we let people have a nice, slow experience. And so you can look around and there's, there's police cars around there to kind of give you a little sense of ominous, you know, ominous pneus. But most people are just like, Wow, I've never seen anything in VR before. And so we give them a chance to hear that, then the next thing we do is we, we explain that this happens, everywhere, can happen to anybody can happen lots and lots of different ways. And then. And then we basically show what it's what it's like for her in the place where she's being kept. And so one of the things that I found during my research for this is that people become trauma bonded to their captors, very much like you would expect with Stockholm Syndrome, or things like that. They, they feel love for them. But because every so often, that person does horrible, horrible things to them, they are they become addicted to being in love with them. And they're very confused. So a lot of the lot, a lot of the dialogue that's in there is about her, not knowing why she loves this quy, but she does love him, but she doesn't know why she's scared of him. And it's very, very complicated. The topics that are covered, and I have I have an entire blog about this, but the topics that are covered in here are abandonment, broken families, divorce, parents working too many hours not getting enough attention from them. Screen time, we talk about pregnancy, we talk about physical abuse, sexual abuse. And it just kind of just goes on and on. And people are people are using this to I was describing this to you earlier, they're using it to get children and adults better prepared for a therapeutic session with a counselor or us or, sure or at their school. So they go through there. And they they they find something they can identify with. So it's like this is this is a kid's life, you know, what's it like? So then when the kids finish the or take off the headset, and they're finished the experience, and they actually talk about the the issues that they have? I don't know if I answered your question. Well, no, you did. Okay, cool. You did. It's it took a lot of effort. And yeah, as I was telling you, one of the things we're doing right now is we're building a domestic servitude simulation, we're using the same environment, but changing the dialogue. And I think that's a really great way to reuse the reuse the content and you know, basically try to make it will save money, honestly, to be honest. And it's really important to us because we're broke. I keep poor, I pour everything back into this. But it's, it's been really fascinating going I've done about four months of research on domestic servitude, and then trying to turn domestic servitude into a list of learning objectives has been really complicated, because there's just not a lot of surveys on this, and not a lot of studies and not a lot of data, trying to find out what is the most common situation of domestic servitude in America. I mean, I've got multiple advisors that I've talked to multiple survivors. I've looked at all the studies that I can get my hands on, and that the evidence is weak. As far as trying to find out what the most common situation is. There's tons of anecdotal evidence, and there's tons of people that have been arrested for it. Oh, yeah. But it's like China's, it turns out that it's the it's, it's a young woman from Southeast Asia, who comes over to work for a family through

the, through the visa system. That's I can't reverse H two, h one, h two B. And there's other ones too, there's multiple types of visas that you could that you could wind up getting over here on. But yeah, just trying to figure out all that stuff and look at it and be able to say with authority that I built this based on the best data that was available to me. It's really important to me, but there's just not a lot of it.

Then we also include online training so all of your all of your staff will get a certificate course so you know that your staff has actually actually been trained and you know what they learned Then we also include the free version if they want. And then just a little thing that talks about all the other people that are that are current licensees, I got a couple more states to put on here now. But that kind of gives you an

idea of, you know, the things that people need to know, you get a headset included this headset is, this is the Oculus quest one. You get to put it on go through the experience itself. And we include some really awesome custom headphones. From direct sound. We're very excited that they they went and made the efforts to put our

And yeah, and who knows what other kinds of surprises are gonna be in there, I made the box really big for a reason. So, you know, every time we every time we get any licensee we reinvest into in the box. So this weekend, we had gotten, we got we got to the licensee got our, our, our Native American tribe. And we took that and put, we bought 30 New headsets, and I spent the entire weekend setting them all up cleaning them. Oh yeah, there's another part of this. So we replaced we actually replace the soft foam I cover with this thing from VR cover. And it is a sanitary, sanitary thing that actually comes off with Velcro, so the velcro comes off. And you can clean that separately. Because the default one kind of stinks. And you know, now, like I said, these things are they're used and you can get them on eBay for 40 bucks, this thing, just this is \$30 to buy a VR cover thing. And they're out of print. So I had to call them and they put the head pulled them all together from all their different locations. So it's sounds pretty crazy. But yeah, so that's the that's the box. And once you show it to other people like there's, there's a guy named Colin who has a small, really small group that he's working with. And he is absolutely in love with us. He says he takes it everywhere. And he is trying he's he's getting people to to help him raise the money for the license. And I will also say that I am not going to let money be the problem. So if if you know, if a group can't afford to do the full licence payment, that's fine. If it's going to take them longer, that's fine. We have three tiers of license fees. So like if you're a small group, my goal is to get it to you as inexpensively as possible. We charge \$5,000 Right now, that is a forever license, you get to keep it forever and train as many people as you want. You can buy as many headsets over time as you want. Then we have a second and those are for small nonprofits, high schools and middle schools. Then we have a second tier, which is for a for a community college or a larger nonprofit. And that's \$10,000 a year. And then we have a third tier, which is for universities or job training, and that's \$20,000 a year. So if you can afford it, you are helping the smaller people get it.

And I attended in 2000, the Ohio Bigfoot conference in an expo and I was really took advantage of the networking opportunities there to meet people from other parts of the country who were interested in, you know, the things that you're interested in my own personal opinion is there's nothing better than hanging out with like minded people with a common interest. I mean, it just doesn't get any better than that. Because, you know, we're all Bigfoot nerds or whatever. And, and, you know, it's a lot of the conversations are not Bigfoot related at these events, but you know, you form friendships and relationships with these people and you know, enjoy hanging out and shooting the breeze with them. Regardless of Whether it's Bigfoot or whatever subject that you might be discussing. So when I went to this event in, in 2000 I thought to myself, well,

you know, there's nothing like this in Texas. And, you know, I bet I bet I could pull one of these off here. And so, you know, the wheels started turning and the gears are meshing and, and so I started, you know, planning an event and, and the reason I picked Jefferson, Texas is actually, a lot of people would probably be surprised, had nothing to do with the Bigfoot reports and such from this area, it was the fact that my folks own the bed and breakfast in Jefferson. And my mom was on the events committee for the bed and breakfast association. So I had, I had resources to pull from. So that's why it's actually a hits actually here in Jefferson the Jefferson conference, because that's where he got started. And, and the town has, you know, really embraced the event and the subject. You know, the mayor signed the proclamation and 2018 that Jefferson was the big foot Capital of Texas, and, you know, erected a big foot statue in town across the street from the visitor center. And, you know, most of the restaurants here in town have a big foot named or themed item on the menu, and a lot of the stores have, you know, big foot merchandise for sale. And so it's really, like I said, it's really been embraced here in town, and like I said, you know, and the very first one that I held was in 2001, it was actually September 15 2001, which was four days after 911. And the event still went off, and we still have about 135 people that attended. And it's generally been an annual event since then. So an opportunity came up to to do the same thing for Foulk. Over the years. There's been different about last year themed events in Faust, that different people who put on and, you know, save gaming lamp, for the most part. So the last one that was officially there, before I started doing anything was in 2015. There was a group that put it on for I think, about three years there, but then it kind of faded out. And so in 2018, after the Bigfoot conference in Jefferson, a lot of times on the Sunday, we'll take a group trip up to FAU, which is less than an hour away from Jefferson. And so we went up there to fouch abunch of us and went up to the monster bar, which is a really cool convenience store with a fat monster theme and they put museum inside of a lot of Bigfoot merchandise. And so we went up there and it just so happened that Mayor of Phalke was there, Mayor Terry Purvis was there at the fmrs Fremont that day, and myself and allow Blackburn, you know, know, Terry really well. And he was just wondering why we, you know, we had such a large group of people that were there that day. And we said that, you know, we had just finished up the Bigfoot conference, the Texas Bigfoot conference in Jefferson and usually, we like to bring people up to power and, and he lamented the fact that, you know, he wished that they had, you know, still had a fat monster themed event there and found and, and, you know, the whole bow thing the legend of Boggy Creek was very influential on me as a young kid, and seeing the legend of Boggy Creek In the theater in 1973, during its national release, and so I told I told Mayor tarea said, you know, I would be honored to, you know, to plan an event and host an event there in bow, celebrating the sock monster. And, you know, the legend of Boggy Creek and all that. And so we put wheels in motion again, and in 2019. held the first one that Raul and I put together for foul. And unfortunately, the next year COVID. And Bauke was pretty much shut down. So we actually held the event. Event was already planned and, you know, tickets selling and, and so we had to use the convention center and texture camera, because there wasn't any facility in South. Yeah. That was open to the public. Because of COVID restrictions. Yeah. And even then in to hold it in Texarkana. I had to write a an action plan for the

Well, yeah, the Arkansas State Health Department, I had to write an action plan to submit to the, the health department of the state of Arkansas. Yeah. With the, you know, the things I was going to do, you know, social distancing groups of people, you know, six feet apart. Hand Sanitizer stations, you know, all these things, you know, signage, mask requirements, and all this stuff that, you know, had to be done to have an event with more than 100 people. Yeah. And more than a private gathering? Yes. So, you know, we had to do this, we had to have a much larger facility. So, you know, we could have social distancing, I mean, the seating was so spread out, but, you know, it was in the actual convention center. So it was, you know, a really cool facility, and the hotel that we were working with, that is the Holiday Inn, that is there, the same facility, the same building is the convention center and the hotel. So we, you know, we had to still use reduced capacity, we could only have a percentage of the, you know, the official capacity of the room. But we were able to pull it off successfully and enjoyable event. And then, you know, since then COVID restrictions had been, had been softened. And, you know, but we still, you know, suggest people wear a mask, if they feel better have hand sanitizer around trying to social distance. And, you know, we've never had through all of COVID All of my events have still taken place, and we've never had a COVID outbreak, I've never even had a report of anybody that attended that later came down with COVID. So it's been, you know, been pretty successful and, you know, still going strong. So, you know, the town embraces the event there. You know, there's locals that don't like the fat monster whole thing. But, you know, 1000s of small town of, you know, what, just over 800 people 800 people and, you know, tons of people come through foul every day, you know, because of the pout monster and the legend of Boggy Creek and to go to the monster mark. So, you know, that town depends on on tourism, for folks to come in, just like here in Jefferson Jefferson is a town of less than, well, the official population, I believe is 18 114 people. And, you know, it's a tourist base town. And so, you know, you they depend on tourism to support the town. And so, you know, I do my part to host events here in town, not just Bigfoot events, but I also host a UFO convention. I had a car showing here. That was a couple of weeks ago. Yeah. To, you know, to bring people to town to keep the town thriving. Like I said it depends on tourism.

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Yeah. Yeah. And it's it's interesting sometimes like you said, not everybody in Phalke is all about the Phalke monster, it's interesting to see the parts of communities that do kind of reject in and shun those histories. Even I spent quite a bit of time in Salem, Massachusetts, for example, when I lived in when I lived in Maine, there's a lot of people that live in Salem, you know, few schools or that kind of stuff. And most people, they understand what their towns about all that kind of stuff, but there's, there's quite a few people that do not do not like the tourism of it, and don't don't want anybody there for that reason. And it's, it's interesting to see that reaction amongst communities sometimes.

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Well, you know, they need to realize that, you know, the sales tax that tourism brings in the, you know, the hotel, and motel tax, you know, the those, you know, towns like that depend on that stuff for their, you know, annual budget and, you know, that goes towards the, you know, the infrastructure of the town, you know, people don't, don't think about that, that, you know, maybe your locals and live there, don't think about, you know, you know, traffic lights and potholes being filled, and, and, you know, stuff like that, that, that, you know, tourism taxes

bring in to keep things running smoothly. I mean, you know, a lot of small towns like that, that have these things, you know, like, you know, Point Pleasant West Virginia, you know, you know, the, like I said, the tax from taxes from tourists, the tourism, tourist dollars, you know, people think about, oh, well, you know, the bed and breakfast or the hotels, you know, sure, they're, they're having tourists stay there. So they're making money, but they pay taxes to the city, you know, that is then used for the city's budget, to spread around to, you know, improvements in town. And, and, like I said, even filling potholes, and, you know, working on the sewers, and, you know, these things, help pay those things and small towns, you know, small towns like that, if they relied on merely the locals to fund everything. You know, it wouldn't happen.

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People do not realize that, as you well know, as my audience knows, I work in the events industry, Craig, and people do not realize the amount of money that that brings in for a town like when when COVID happened, they did a real quick count of what Houston was going to lose within a month and a half of like, three major events. Sure, shut down. And it was it was like 130 million, right, in like a month. Because of the hotels that were going to be filled the tickets that were going to be sold to the convention center, which yes, is city property,

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you know, likely to get rent at restaurants and the food

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trucks that come in now, all that stuff, you know, it really is it's a major thing. I live in Austin now, and we just got to South by Southwest. And yes, yeah, you know, it's now partially owned by not InBev. But you know, their sponsor, Budweiser is financially invested in it now, all kinds of things. It's no longer to buy a t shirt to come see 25 bands play that it was right. I was in high school. Let's put it that way. It's now on an international stage. You know, and and that's just it. Some of these things, start hitting large, large audiences and even even Falcon monster fast has gotten to the point rapidly.

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Where Yeah, we've had we've had to move to a larger facility where It's going to be at the auditorium for the middle school out town. You know, like I said back is 100 people so you can imagine, you know that that's a small town. I mean, there's that. You know, there's a couple of mom and pop restaurants. There's a gas station, there's a couple of convenience stores, there's you know, there's like, yeah, there's one once one stoplight in town. Yeah. It's, it's a one stoplight. And in no way,

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if you blink, you'll miss it.

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Sure, sure. And, you know, we bring hundreds of people in the town that weekend. To, you know, we, you know, we got a food truck coming in this year, that's going to be set up on site that's going to be serving all kinds of big themed menu with based on Indian frybread Indian frybread burgers and, and stuff. So, it's gonna be nice. You know, we're gonna have the guided fountain monster tours through town, you know, where we, we point go and point out, you know, areas, you know, locations that were in, they were in the film, but I took a bite the creek as well as actual locations of, you know, reported Park monster sightings, as well as you know, a nice staff of folks can get out and stretch your legs, they're actually on Boggy Creek. So, you know, we just, like I said, trying to make an enjoyable event for folks to come in that, you know, grew up, you know, watching the legend of Boggy Creek or seeing it as a kid or their parents taking a drive and scaring the crap out of them and never wanting to sleep or sit next to a window. You know, just

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You're gonna make me feel bad about some of the movies my kids watched.

You know, we got we got loud Blackburn who's, you know, become, you know, Minister Powell. I mean is real.

And who's going to be talking about you know, strange out outdoor encounters in nature and Jerry has him longtime Bigfoot researcher, Jeff Stewart, another outdoorsman with Bigfoot encounters. To be, you know, talk about that we're going to be showing the small town monsters, Boggy Creek monster film after the talks Saturday, so there's gonna be a lot going on be a lot for people to see. And like I said, you know, these events are really good for you know, meeting other enthusiast you know, most of the very best friends I haven't hired for people that I've met through Bigfoot and, and meeting them at events such as this and you know, man sitting out and like I said, we got a host hotel where a lot of people will be staying at Texarkana where the speakers are staying, the other people serving a lot of opportunities just to sit around discussing about miles or whatever people want to talk about, but sitting around the fire pit outside night, just enjoying the weekend. And, you know, the camaraderie of a Bigfoot.

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I have I know, I've told you have said it, and probably just about every cryptid show that I have done and every bit of coverage that I've done from the cryptid events, amongst all of the communities that I have done events with, from remote viewing to near death experience MUFON the paranormal, the cryptid community, Bigfoot specifically, I think As the most hip to hip, we're in this together camaraderie. It is it is very much an extended family. I know I've said it before, it reminds me a lot of going to Comic Con, like I can go to Comic Con this year in Houston, where I'm supposed to be speaking and guaranteed there are 10 vendors there, that when I walk up will know who I am. Right? You know, because I've been there year after year, I used to go into their comic book shops, you know, stuff like that. And it's just those many, many year camaraderie ease and the the cryptid community and especially the Bigfoot events are very much that way people swap stories. They swap family stories, it's, it's really beautiful to see, it's great.

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Well, as I said, you know, there's nothing better than hanging out with like minded people with a common interest. I mean, that to me, you know, and I've told people for years, as a matter of fact, you know, the nearly 25 years of active Bigfoot research, you know, being in the community that I have, that I've told people over the years that, you know, more than 50% of it is the camaraderie, the the, you know, gains friends, gaining, you know, just, you know, that, like I said, hanging out, and not necessarily, you know, Bigfoot related, other than that, how you met each other, but, you know, some of my best friends of mine for people that I've met, you know, being involved in Bigfoot research and hosting these types of events and, and seeing the people that, you know, come from all over the country that, you know, I don't see very often but I see them, you know, every year when they come to the event, I mean, I've, I've told people, you know, you know, one good thing about, you know, organizing and hosting a conferences, it's a way for me to bring my friends in from out of town, you know, to hang out for the weekend. You know, I don't get to see Jeff Meldrum you know, or, you know, Cliff Barickman or Bobo, I don't get to see them, you know, on a normal, you know, basis all the time. But, you know, having a conference allows me the opportunity to fly them in and put them up for the weekend and, and hang out with them and

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support our research in that way.

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For sure, sure. I mean, it's, it's, it's an opportunity that bring my friends to town to hang out, you know, is when you get down just to the the nitty gritty of it. And the the conference itself is, you know, the means to do that.
